SALON DES REFUSÉS 2024 The 'alternative' Archibald and Wynne Prizes

Salon des Refusés was initiated by the S.H. Ervin Gallery in 1992 in response to the large number of works entered into the prestigious Archibald Prize at the Art Gallery of New South Wales. Each year the S.H. Ervin panel is invited to go behind the scenes of the judging process and select an 'alternative' exhibition from those not chosen for display in the award exhibition.

S.H. Ervin Gallery's 'alternative' selection is a much-anticipated feature that rivals the selections in the 'official' exhibition, with works selected for quality, diversity, humour and experimentation, and which examine contemporary art practices, different approaches to portraiture and responses to the landscape. In 2024, 60 works were selected for the exhibition, with 38 from the Archibald Prize and 22 from the Wynne Prize by selectors Brad Hammond, Director, Orange Regional Gallery and Jane Watters, Director, S.H. Ervin Gallery.

REFLECTIONS OF THE SUN: BLENHEIM AND VERSAILLES

with Associate Professor Robert Wellington Thursday 10 October 6:00–7:15pm

When he routed Louis XIV's armies in the War of the Spanish Succession, John Churchill (1650–1722), the first Duke of Marlborough claimed the spoils of victory, including a thirty-ton marble bust of his adversary which he installed on the top of Blenheim Palace as a trophy. The removal of this statue from what was once the site of the French king's power to this new national monument signalled a change in the balance of power in Europe.

Nearly two hundred years after Blenheim was built, Charles Spencer-Churchill (1871–1934), the ninth Duke of Marlborough vowed to restore his family's reputation and its seat, Blenheim, to its former glory. With the family coffers diminished and the income from his estates inadequate, he married Conseulo Vanderbilt, one of the most eligible 'dollar duchesses' of the age. The renovation of Blenheim Palace carried out with the vast Vanderbilt dowry made that British house more French than it was ever meant to be. This talk by Associate Professor Robert Wellington, an internationally recognised expert on the arts of ancien-régime France, will show that Blenheim's once subtle play of emulation and rivalry became an out-and-out tribute to the style of old regime France.

If you have visited the gallery since July or have taken the *Fermoy on Foot* walking art trail, you are likely to have noticed a painting of a pug mounted proudly on the iron gate outside Fermoy House. This elegant picture was painted in 1888 by celebrated British canine artist Maud Earl, and was acquired by David Roche at auction in 2006.

Canine connections to Fermoy House can be found long before David's purchase of the property in early 1954, and in fact date back to the residence's earliest days. In 1897, not long after Frederick Kilsby, his wife, and their twin babies moved into the newly-built home, the family's six-month old pug, Leo, escaped. This is confirmed by a classified placed in the *Express & Telegraph* on 29 and 30 October 1897, offering a reward.

While little else is known of Leo's life on Melbourne Street, the re-discovery of this tidbit only enriches the many and varied canine connections to Fermoy House.

NEW ACQUISITION



The David Roche Gallery is grateful to Member and Volunteer Dr Leslie Stephan for the gift of two circular dishes, made and decorated at the Worcester Porcelain Factory, Britain around 1810.

Popular interest in natural history grew throughout the eighteenth century, spurred by global exploration, rising literacy rates, and the establishment of publicly-accessible museums. Particularly dedicated and usually prosperous amateurs formed their own natural history collections, be it through the cultivation of plant specimens, the establishment of private menageries, or the pursuit of collecting mineralogical and conchological specimens. The impact of this can be seen on decorative arts, which began to depict animals, plants, and minerals with increasingly accurate detail towards the early nineteenth century.

These dishes feature hand-painted scenes of shells and corals in the well, with the 'Barr's Orange' walls handsomely embellished with gilt. Prior to Dr Stephan's ownership, the dishes were the property of Howard Emerson Flight, Baron Flight, a direct descendent of Thomas Flight, who purchased the Worcester factory in 1783.

This pair of plates joins Dr Stephan's earlier gift of a Berlin woolwork rug depicting a spaniel, and expands David Roche's handsome group of shell-painted works produced at Worcester. Among these are a pair of square-form dishes bearing near-identical decoration, formerly owned by legendary Sotheby's auctioneer Robert Woolley.




Image detail: John Walther (USA), photographer, Chester Weinberg chats with model Catarina 1971, photographic print. Private Collection, Adelaide.


